

**THE LONG BRANCH LECTURES 2008**

**Three Winter Sundays in the Great Hall at Historic Long Branch**

5 p.m. Sunday, January 27: **George Clemon Freeman, Jr., Esq.**, became a leader in Virginia’s conservation legislation soon after he began practicing law in Richmond, 1957. By 1962 he was elected chair of the Virginia Chapter of the Nature Conservancy, and in 1965 was named special counsel to the Virginia Assembly study group that drafted lynchpin legislation for the easement donation movement. Today’s Virginia Department of Historic Resources, Virginia Outdoors Foundation, and the perpetual open-space easement program all were created more than 40 years ago by this study group. Mr. Freeman, Senior Partner in Hunton & Williams still active on environmental issues, will speak on *Conservation Easements: The Prospects in 2008*.

5 p.m. Sunday, February 10: **Douglas Waller**, after almost two decades as a magazine correspondent (Newsweek, TIME), has retired to teach and to follow his successful biography of Brig. Gen. William (“Billy”) Mitchell with another, now in progress, about Maj. Gen. William (“Wild Bill”) Donovan. At TIME, from 1994 until last March, Mr. Waller was a diplomatic correspondent throughout Europe, Asia and the Middle East, including the Persian Gulf region. He became also a witty observer of the Washington scene. This fall he taught a college course that he will encapsulate at Long Branch, *The Press and Politics: How the Media Are Covering the Presidential Campaign*.

5 p.m. Sunday, February 17: **J. Alfred Broaddus, Jr.**, was president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond from 1993 until his retirement in 2004, a role that made him a member of the Federal Open Market Committee of the Federal Reserve System. His 34-year career with the Bank included serving as director of research; in his retirement he is a member of the Economic Advisory Panel of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. The list of private and non-profit boards of directors on which he still serves suggests that no Central Virginia leadership group feels comfortable without him. His title, *Reflections on a Fed Career*, allows Mr. Broaddus latitude to address changes in the economy from just before OPEC cornered world oil pricing through the aftermath of 9/11.
